The Mayor's Memo

Public Health

There has been a lot of media hype about the dangers of the Coronavirus (now COVID-19) which seems out of proportion to the actual risk and extent of the illness.

The scariest parts

Someone can have the virus and show no symptoms for up to 14 days. That means someone could be a carrier and pass normal screening, so it is considered more contagious than the flu or other viruses.

As of today, the number of new cases in South Korea exceeds those of new cases in China (if the Chinese government is being honest).

The Chinese government has not been forthcoming with specifics of the virus to help other countries combat the spread; and worse yet, has cracked down on medical professionals who tried to warn of the danger.

The Reality

The virus is more contagious, but the percent of patients who die from the illness is lower than those who had become infected with SARS (Severe acute Respiratory Syndrome) and MERS (Middle East Respiratory Syndrome).

As of today (March 1), there are 78 US cases which includes 44 contracted while on a cruise ship that had docked in Japan. There are currently 3 deaths in the US.

To find, test and produce the number of doses of a vaccine will take over a year.

In the US, 30,000 to 60,000 people die from the flu each year.

Prevention

The CDC DOES NOT recommend that people who are well wear a facemask to protect themselves from respiratory diseases, and that facemasks should be used by people who show symptoms to help prevent the spread of the disease to others.

The CDC DOES recommend you wash your hands often with soap and water for at least 20 seconds, especially after going to the bathroom, before eating, and after blowing your nose, coughing, or sneezing.

Green Waste

We are anticipating the delivery of green waste bins from Logan City on Monday, March 23rd. Please do not place any green waste on the ground before the bins are in place.

Curbside green waste pick up will begin the week of April 1st and our collection day will remain on Wednesday.

Providence City is no longer be providing curb side branch pickup.

Green waste dumpsters will be available at the Public Works facility. There have been problems with contamination, and Logan City is looking for ways to remedy this problem. Please help do your part so that we can continue with this free service for Providence residents.

Just as a reminder, the following list is what is **ALLOWED** to be put in the dumpsters or your *curbside* green waste container: grass, leaves that are **NOT bagged**, garden waste, clean hay & straw, shrubs, branches and non-invasive weeds. Branches cannot be over 6' in length or 12" in diameter. If your items are not included in this list, then do not use the green waste dumpsters.

The green waste dumpsters are for residential use and are not for landscaping companies. If you see this type of violation, please call the City office and tell the receptionist you are calling to report a Code violation.

We will have a garbage and metal dumpster at the public works facility sometime in April for 2 weeks. Check the Providence City website, watch the newsletter, and sign up for the Providence Pipeline for notification.

The City will not be liable for any damage occurring to any vehicle or equipment parked on any street or right-of-way, during street and right-of-way maintenance.

Providence City Works to be 100 Percent Compliant with Newly Proposed State Auditor Fraud Risk Assessment Guidelines

The council and management have taken significant steps to have the city reduce its risks, and improve its service to the public. This has included a thorough review of city policies and procedures, as well as making modifications to employee responsibilities. We believe these changes will better protect our employees and the public. We are working for continual improvement, as we serve our residents.

We also are working at improving our transparency and have moved to live streaming Planning and Zoning, and City Council meetings so more residents can be better informed of what our city it doing. We have also added a page to our website specifically around providing data transparency. This page is modeled after the guidelines published by the Sutherland Institute.

Eleven things you can do to prevent storm water runoff pollution.

- Use fertilizers sparingly and sweep up driveways, sidewalks, and gutters
- Never dump anything down storm drains or in streams
- Vegetate bare spots in your yard
- · Compost your yard waste
- Use less toxic pesticides, learn how to prevent pest problems
- Direct downspouts away from paved surfaces
- Take your car to the car wash instead of washing it in the driveway
- · Check your car for fluid leaks
- · Recycle your motor oil
- · Pick up after your pet
- Sweep up dirt and mud from vehicles instead of washing it off into the gutter and storm drains
- Report problems and illicit discharges

Switch all of your bills to paperless

Start a compost heap in your garden

Food wastage is a massive problem all around the world. In Europe alone, the food wasted could feed approximately 200 million people. Starting a compost heap in your garden will help your get rid of kitchen and garden waste efficiently and you add nutrients to the soil.

Buy a reusable water bottle

In 2016, over 480 billion plastic bottles were sold, which is over 60 for every person. If everyone had a reusable water bottle, then this number would decrease greatly. If you don't already own one, go out and buy a bottle that you can take with you everywhere you go.

Give up chewing gum

You might think that chewing gum is environmentally friendly, but it is actually made from synthetic rubber, which is plastic. Around 100,000 tons are thrown away every year, and a lot of it ends up on our streets. Next time you want minty-fresh breath, just brush your teeth instead.

Walk or ride a bike

Cars contribute greatly to air pollution and have a negative impact on human health. They produce dangerous gasses such as carbon monoxide and nitrogen oxides, which then enter our atmosphere that we have to breathe in.


